| COURSE SEQUENCE SUGGESTIONS |  |  |

- Philosophy majors should complete LIB 110 Reason and the Self (3) and PHI 223 Introduction to Logic (3) in their first two years. LIB 110 is offered every semester. PHI 223 is offered in the spring semester.
- By the end of their junior year, philosophy majors should have completed at least four 300-level philosophy courses. One or two of these may be completed in the student's first two years after taking LIB 110. The philosophy faculty usually offers two 300-level philosophy courses per semester.
- POL 210 Western Political Heritage I (3) and POL 215 Western Political Heritage II (3) are appropriate for first- and second-year students. Each may be taken in place 300 -level philosophy course in the philosophy major.
- By the end of the senior year, philosophy majors should have completed at least seven 300 -level philosophy courses, including those taken in the first three years. The 300-level courses should be distributed so that there is at least one course in each of the following categories: ancient philosophy, modern philosophy, metaphysics and epistemology, and ethics. The philosophy faculty offers at least or course in each category every two years.
- Philosophy majors should complete PHI 498 Senior Paper (2) in their last semester It requires the revision and expansion of a paper that was written in a 300-level philosophy course. The senior paper is a substantial project that should not be attempted while taking a heavy load of courses.
- $\quad$ Students wishing to pursue graduate-level philosophy should complete more than $t$ minimum number of philosophy courses for the philosophy major and should consu with the philosophy faculty before the senior year about the graduate school application process and the student's prospects.

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## BACHELOR OF ARTS Graduation Requirements

The student must do the following to receive a bachelor of arts degree:

1. COMPLETE A MINIMUM OF 120 CREDIT HOURS OF STUDY, AT LEAST 60 OF WHICH OR AT LEAST THE LAST 30 CREDITS BEFORE GRADUATION ARE AT SOUTHERN VIRGINIA. No MORE THAN 9 CREDIT HOURS WILL BE GRANTED FOR INTERNSHIP COURSES.
2. COMPLETE ALL REQUIREMENTS OF THE SOUTHERN VIRGINIA CORE.
3. COMPLETE ALL REQUIREMENTS OF AT LEAST ONE MAJOR.
4. EARN A MINIMUM GRADE POINT AVERAGE OF 2.00 ON ALL COURSE WORK TAKEN AT THE UNIVERSITY.
5. COMPLY WITH ALL UNIVERSITY STANDARDS, REGULATIONS, AND PROCEDURES, FROM THE DATE OF MATRICULATION THROUGH THE DATE OF FINAL GRADUATION.

Philosophy wrestles with fundamental questions in all areas of human knowledge and activity. Such questions include:

- How does knowledge differ from mere belief?
- Do I determine my actions or are they determined by causes other than myself?
- Is my mind different from my body?
- What makes an action right?
- What makes a life good?
- What makes a society just?
- What makes a work of art beautiful?

Struggling with and developing reasoned views about such issues enlarge one's capacity for clear thinking, effective writing, and persuasive speaking. Philosophy encourages the intellectual curiosity necessary for a life of sustained inquiry and cultivates a taste for matters of importance over matters of show. Moreover, philosophy's preference for rational persuasion over compulsion prepares one for responsible citizenship in a diverse nation and world.

PHI 223 Introduction to Logic (GE) (3)
PHI 498 Senior Paper (2-3)
Major Electives: an additional 21 credit hours of philosophy coursework, including three credit hours from each of the following four areas:
(1 ancient philosophy (PHI 210, PHI 257, PHI 355R)
(2 modern philosophy (PHI 215, PHI 365R)
(3 metaphysics and epistemology (PHI 325R, 326, 333, or 335R)
(4 ethics ( $\mathrm{PHI} 340,345 \mathrm{R}$, or 350 ).

POL 210 Western Political Heritage I (3) and POL 215 Western Political Heritage II (3) may be used as electives in the philosophy major but do not satisfy one of the four distribution areas.

Philosophy majors who use PHI 210 and 215 to satisfy their civilization requirement must take an additional 210 or 215 course from one of the following options: ART 210, ART 215, HIS 210, HIS 215, POL 210, or POL 215.
