analyze language carefully, to consider history and culture closely, and to appreciate the contours of Western culture by reference to their precursors and developments. Classics is the original interdisciplinary major, comprising the study of ancient art, language, history, literature, religion, mathematics, philosophy, and economics. With appropriate supplementary coursework, majors in classical studies are particularly well prepared for law school, medical school, and graduate programs in history, philosophy, linguistics, religious studies, medieval studies, and comparative literature. Moreover, one of the most important opportunities afforded by classical studies for religiously-grounded students is the ability to study the New Testament in the original Koinē (a dialect of ancient Greek), a study undertaken in the second year of Greek that lays the foundation for a lifetime of direct access to this sacred scripture.

Learning Objectives

1. Students completing the major in classical studies will:
Explicate the elementary grammar and basic stylistic devices of Latin and/or ancient Greek.
2. Identify the major periods of Greek and Roman history and locate the most important developments within them.
3. Compare and contrast salient features Greek and Roman culture.
4. Identify major authors with the genre(s) they represent.
5. Find and use primary sources and L'année philologique to write a research paper on a topic in classical studies.

CLASSICAL STUDIES MAJOR REQUIREMENTS
(29 CREDIT HOURS)

Study of the classics allows students to approach directly the language, culture, and literature of ancient Greece and Rome, the two sources of the liberal arts and two of the most fundamental civilizations of Western culture. It develops the cognitive capacity to
